Do's

Educate Yourself: Learn what constitutes sexual harassment in all forms.

Respect Boundaries: Honor others' physical and emotional limits; ask if unsure.

Seek Consent: Ensure clear, enthusiastic consent; silence isn't consent.

Support Victims: Listen empathetically and encourage reporting if needed.

Be an Active Bystander: Intervene safely or report sexual harassment when witnessed.

Speak Respectfully: Use inclusive, non-objectifying language.

Be Mindful of Power: Avoid exploiting authority in relationships.

Report Issues: Inform university authorities of sexual harassment cases.

Promote Awareness: Support campaigns fostering respect and safety.



Don'ts

Ignore Cues: Stop immediately if someone looks uncomfortable.

Assume Consent: Never presume someone's intentions without clear communication.

Objectify: Avoid reducing people to their physical appearance.

Encourage Pressure: Don't engage in or enable peer pressure.

Blame Intoxication:

Substance use is no excuse for misconduct.

Share Inappropriate
Content: Avoid sharing
explicit materials without
consent.

Retaliate: Accept feedback without defensiveness or revenge.

Dismiss Concerns: Take discomfort or allegations seriously.

Spread Rumors: Respect privacy; don't gossip or share false claims.
