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RELEASE OF NATIONAL FACT SHEET OF GLOBAL YOUTH TOBACCO SURVEY (GYTS-4), BY DR. MANSUKH MANDAVIYA, HON'BLE UNION HEALTH MINISTER

Global Youth Tobacco Survey (GYTS), a component of the Global Tobacco Surveillance System (GTSS), is a global standard for systematically monitoring youth tobacco use (smoking and smokeless) and tracking key tobacco control indicators. GYTS is a cross-sectional, nationally representative, school-based survey of students in grades associated with ages 13-15 years. It assists countries in fulfilling their obligations under the World Health Organization (WHO) Framework Convention on Tobacco Control (FCTC) to generate comparable data within and across countries.

The Ministry of Health and Family Welfare (MoHFW) designated the International Institute for Population Sciences (IIPS) as the nodal agency to conduct the GYTS-4 under the guidance of Technical Advisory Committee with necessary support from the WHO India office. GYTS-4 was designed to provide national and state/UT level estimates of tobacco use among school going children aged 13-15 years by sex, location of school (rural-urban), and management of school (public-private). The objective of the survey was to provide information on tobacco use (smoking and smokeless), cessation, second-hand smoke, access and availability, exposure to anti-tobacco information, awareness and receptivity to tobacco marketing, knowledge, and attitudes. 97,302 students from 987 schools (Public-544; Private-443) participated in the survey. Of which, 80,772 students aged 13-15 years were considered for reporting.

IIPS successfully completed the field survey for GYTS-4 in 2019 and prepared the National and State/UT fact sheets by providing its key findings. Shri Mansukh Mandaviya, Hon'ble Union Minister for Health and Family Welfare released the National Fact Sheet of GYTS-4 on August 10, 2021.

The Union Minister emphasized the early awareness of the ill effects of tobacco among children. He said, "The more and the sooner, we create awareness among children about the harmful effects of tobacco use, the better will be the outcomes in terms of reduction in prevalence of tobacco use among children and consequently, among adults". "Harmful effects of tobacco use should be incorporated into the school curricula at various levels starting right from the primary school level", he added.

WORLD POPULATION DAY 2021: SYMPOSIUM

On the occasion of World Population Day, The Short-Term Training Programme and Publications Cell (STTP & PC) of the IIPS organized a virtual symposium on July 12, 2021 through the WebEx platform on the theme-COVID-19: Challenges for healthcare delivery and vaccination drives in India. Dr. Gagandeep Kang, Professor, The Wellcome Trust Research Laboratory Division of Gastrointestinal Sciences, Christian Medical College, Vellore and **Dr. Sudha Ramani**, Independent Consultant on Health Policy and Systems Research (HPSR) were the eminent speakers at the Symposium.

WORKSHOPS & TRAINING PROGRAMMES ORGANIZED

Online Workshop on "Introduction to R: Demographic and Spatial Analysis"

The Short-Term Training Programme & Publications Cell (STTP & PC) of the International Institute for Population Sciences (IIPS) in collaboration with Max Planck Institute for Demographic Research (MPIDR), Rostock, Germany & Federal Institute for Population Research (BiB), Wiesbaden, Germany organised a 5-day online training programme on **"Introduction to R: Demographic and Spatial Analysis"** during April 5-9, 2021 through WebEx video conferencing platform. 50 applicants (25 participants and 25 who audited the R-workshop) from various disciplines across the country participated in the online training programme. The main objective of the training programme was to provide an introduction to the participants regarding performing statistical analyses using 'R' program. Beside theory classes, the participants had hands on training using practical problems relating to the current COVID-19 pandemic. The participants were also imparted skills for conducting spatial analyses in R. Spatial analysis methods are of high relevance as researchers often work with geographically referenced data.

The programme was inaugurated by Prof. K. S. James, Director and Senior Professor, who highlighted the significance of the open-source statistical programs like 'R', which have become the most important tools for quantitative research.

This training programme provided the participating researchers skills for conducting statistical analysis. Further it also provided them with the requisite exposure to gather & prepare data using the R-software. On the first day of the training, topics like **Introduction to R, its objects & operators, using R Studio, Data wrangling and basic plotting** were discussed with hands on practical exercise. On second day and first half of third day, topics like **Regression**

modelling, for-loops & while functions and demographic methods using the Covid-19 pandemic data were discussed with help of R Studio analytical software. The final two and half days focussed on learning with practical examples from specific topics on Spatial Demography, spatial analysis and spatial modelling. These spatial process related topics improved the overall knowledge regarding demographic events as well as enhanced the usefulness, applicability and relevance of statistical models.

Online Training Programme on Sampling Design for Large Scale Surveys for PRCs

International Institute for Population Sciences (IIPS) conducted a ten-day workshop on Sampling design for Large Scale Surveys during the period from 18th May - 18th June, 2021. The workshop was attended by 80-120 participants from various Population Research Centers (PRC) across India. The PRCs that participated included the Institute of Economic Growth, Delhi, Institute for Social & Economic Change, Bengaluru, Kerala University, Punjab University, Patna University, Gokhale Institute of Politics & Economics, Pune, etc.

It was an extensive training programme wherein several sampling techniques and designs, calculation of sample size, estimation of standard errors and application of survey weights were thoroughly discussed to demonstrate the theoretical and practical application of the topics. Prof. K. S. James, Director of IIPS, inaugurated the workshop and emphasized the importance of learning the survey design and developing skills to conduct surveys by the PRCs. Shri. D. K. Ojha, Deputy Director General (Statistics), Ministry of Health & Family Welfare, Govt. of India, highlighted the importance of skill development and capacity building of the research staff of the PRCs. Dr. L.K. Dwivedi, Dr. P. Dhillon and Prof. S.K. Singh were the resource

persons for this workshop. Different applications were discussed along with demonstration of the methods on large-scale data sets such as National Family Health Survey (NFHS), Longitudinal Ageing Study in India (LASI), Sample Registration System (SRS), Sero-Survey, Global Youth Tobacco Survey (GYTS), etc. The participants were given assignments, had discussions on the problem and also got hands-on training.

Workshop on Introduction of Human Mortality Database (HMD)

The International Institute for Population Sciences (IIPS) organized a one-day virtual workshop on September 9, 2021 through WebEx Video Conferencing Application on the Introduction to Human Mortality Databases – HMD. Prof. Usha Ram, the Workshop Coordinator, welcomed the resource persons – Dr. Dmitri Jdanov, Head of the Laboratory for Demographic Data, and Dr. Domantas Jasilionis, Research Scientist at the Max Planck Institute for Demographic Research, Rostock, Germany. Prof. K. S. James, Director and Senior Professor, IIPS, formally inaugurated the workshop. Prof. James emphasized the workshop's importance, especially during the COVID-19 pandemic. Eleven faculty members and 35 research scholars from IIPS, and one research scholar from JNU, New Delhi attended the workshop. The workshop covered the following topics: Background and description of data, including data quality issues; Need for including data for developing countries, especially India and China, in the HMD; Data quality and uses of data for formal demographic analysis; and Use of HMD data for COVID analysis.

BOOK PUBLISHED BY FACULTY

"Migrants, Mobility and Citizenship in India", Edited by Ashwani Kumar and R. B. Bhagat, Routledge India, 2021.

This book reconceptualizes migration studies in India and brings back the idea of citizenship to the center of the contested relationship between the state and internal migrants in the country. It interrogates the multiple vulnerabilities of disenfranchised internal migrants as evidenced in the mass exodus of migrants during the COVID-19 crisis. Challenging dominant economic and demographic theories of mobility and relying on a wide range of innovative heterodox methodologies, this volume points to the possibility of reimagining migrants as 'citizens'.

The volume discusses various facets of internal migration such as the roles of gender, ethnicity, caste, electoral participation of the internal migrants, livelihood diversification, struggle for settlement, and politics of displacement, and highlights the case of temporary, seasonal, and circulatory migrants as the most exploited and invisible

group among migrants. Presenting secondary and recent field data from across regions, including from the northeast, the book explores the processes under which people migrate and suggests ways for ameliorating the conditions of migrants through sustained civic and political action.

RESEARCH PROJECTS COMPLETED

1. Title of the Project: Causes and Consequences of Out Migration from Middle Ganga Plain (2016-2021)

This IIPS sponsored project has been completed, and its report has been published. The project began in February 2016 to understand various aspects of migration from the largest migration sending region of India i.e., Bihar and Eastern UP. This region is geographically identified as the Middle Ganga Plain. The data was collected from 4053 households selected through a multi-stage systematic random sampling technique from 68 PSUs. Quantitative data was collected from respondents, including heads of households, women, elderly, adolescents, and return migrants using Computer Assisted Personal Interviewing (CAPI).



MIGRANTS, MOBILITY AND CITIZENSHIP IN INDIA



The study reported on the levels and patterns of migration from this region, types of migration (short term or seasonal, long-term, and return), the effect of migration on the economy of the households at the origin and perceptions of family members. The migration experiences of the return migrants and the expectations of potential migrants and migration history, push and pull dynamics of internal and international migrants were explored to gain insights into the understanding of the process, experiences and expectations related to migration from the region. The study assessed the consequences of migration on the household economy and the left-behind women, children and elderly, comparing them with their counterparts in non-migrant households. 2. Title of the Project: Study on global AGEing and adult health (WHO-SAGE)- wave 2

World Health Organization sponsored Study on global AGEing and adult health (SAGE) is a multi-country project conducted in China, Ghana, India, Mexico, Russian Federation and South Africa. The SAGE India was implemented in six states – Assam, Karnataka, Maharashtra, Rajasthan, Uttar Pradesh and West Bengal. WHO-SAGE collected data on adults aged 50 years and older, along with a smaller comparison sample of adults 18-49 years. Wave 1 of SAGE India was undertaken 2007-08 and Wave 2 was conducted in 2015. SAGE Wave 2 India included 9,116 completed interviews from 8152 households.

The primary objectives of the survey are-

• To obtain reliable, valid and comparable data on levels of health in a range of key domains for adult populations who are 50 years and older.

• To examine patterns and dynamics of age-related changes in health and wellbeing, using longitudinal follow-up of survey respondents as they age, and to investigate socioeconomic consequences of these health changes;

• To supplement and cross-validate self-reported measures of health and the anchoring vignette approach to improving comparability of self-reported measures, through measured performance tests for selected health



domains;

• To collect data on health examinations and biomarkers to improve reliability of data on morbidity and risk factors and monitor the effect of interventions.

The WHO-SAGE Wave-2 India report has been released and is now available athttps://iipsindia.ac.in/content/SAGE-wave-2. The data is also available on request from the link https://iipsindia.ac.in/content/SAGE-data. The India report includes ten chapters- (i) Introduction, (ii) Methodology, (iii) Household and Individual respondent characteristics, (iv) Income, consumption, transfer and retirement, (v) Risk factors and health behaviors, (vi) Health status, (vii) Morbidity and interventions, (viii) Health examination and biomarkers, (ix) Health care utilization, system responsiveness and financing, and (x) Subjective wellbeing and quality of life.

ACTIVITIES UNDER ONGOING RESEARCH PROJECTS

A. SWABHIMAAN Endline Impact Evaluation Survey: Bihar and Odisha

The SWABHIMAAN Programme is an integrated multi-sectoral strategy to improve girls' and women's nutrition before conception, during pregnancy and after birth in selected blocks of Bihar, Chhattisgarh and Odisha. This is a collaborative project of the Nutrition Division of UNICEF India and the National Rural Livelihood Mission of the Ministry of Rural Development and Panchayati Raj (MoRD & PR). For the baseline, IIPS provided technical support for conducting the survey. For mid- and end-line, IIPS was the nodal agency for carrying out the surveys. The end-line survey of Bihar and Odisha has been completed, and the survey in Chhattisgarh will be over by December 2021.

The field investigators training was conducted by a team of IIPS and members of UNICEF and SRLM (State Rural Livelihood Mission) in Bihar and Odisha. The training for the mapping and listing was conducted simultaneously in both states from 8th to 10th February 2021. The mapping and household listing in the selected blocks began on 11th February 2021. The training of investigators for data collection was conducted in Bihar and Odisha from 24th February to 5th March 2021. The training was given to familiarize investigators with Computer Assisted Personal Interviewing (CAPI) and anthropometric measurements with field-based practice in the last two days.

The data was collected using pretested bilingual questionnaires. There were five interview scheduleshousehold, adolescent girl, pregnant woman, mother and child under two years of age. The data collection in Odisha was completed on 30th August and in Bihar on 30th September 2021. Investigators were supervised by a team of PIs, Co-PIs, and Junior Programme Managers (JPM) and Programmers.

B. Protection of Children Affected by Seasonal Migration: A Study in Jalna District, Maharashtra

This collaborative research project between IIPS and UNICEF-India is aimed at understanding the protection issues of children affected by seasonal migrants in the State of Maharashtra, and to recommend sustainable solutions for strengthening policies and programs for them. Prof. K. C. Das, Prof. R. B. Bhagat, and Prof. Archana K. Roy are the project coordinators.

The online data collection was held in three phases. (1) Pilot data collection (2) Data collection in villages, and (3) Data collection from Block and District level stakeholders. Upon satisfactory completion of pilot data collection, the second phase of data collection was conducted in 12 villages in April, 2021. During the second phase, information was collected from children, parents and village-level stakeholders. The third phase of data collection was conducted in August, 2021 from Block, District and state-level stakeholders.

A 3-day workshop on 'Qualitative Data Analysis & Finalization of Chapter Plan' was conducted on 28 and 29 May, and 11 June 2021. Ms. Gomathy Balasubramanian (TISS) and Dr. Padma Deosthali (IGC) led the sessions on content analysis, grounded theory, narrative analysis, data triangulation, etc. The objectives of the workshop were to make the project team understand data analysis (coding and triangulation), theorization, and presentation of findings.

The third TAC meeting was held online on 6th September 2021. Ms. Sujata Saunik (Additional Chief Secretary, GoM) presided over the meeting. Prof. K. S. James (Director, IIPS), Ms. Rajeshwari Chandrasekar (UNICEF), Ms. Alpa Vora (UNICEF), Prof. R. B. Bhagat, Prof. K. C. Das, and Prof. Archana K. Roy attended the meeting. Preliminary insights from the analysis of data were presented in the meeting.

C. Webinar on Longitudinal Health and Nutrition Surveys in India

The Longitudinal Survey of Maternal and Infant Nutrition in Maharashtra (LoSMINM) project of IIPS organised a one-day webinar on 17th August 2021 on "Longitudinal Health and Nutrition Surveys in India: What we have learnt from recent studies?". The main aim of this workshop was to gain insights on the methodology followed by the previous studies and understand the barriers and facilitators to their approach in conducting cohort studies. The purpose of the seminar was to introduce this longitudinal project to experts and aspiring students from this field. Two hundred and eleven persons attended this webinar.

The webinar started with a welcome note from Dr. Preeti Dhillon, Assistant Professor, IIPS, one of the organisers of this webinar. Further Dr. K.S. James, Director & Sr. Professor, IIPS, presented his opening remarks on behalf of the Institute and presented his thoughts about this new project. The guest of Honour for this webinar was Prof. S. K. Bhargava. He spoke about his experience of carrying out the Delhi Birth Cohort Study. Prof. Bhargava also provided an overview of the challenges faced during this large-scale cohort study implementation and continuation in India.

Prof. Sayeed Unisa, Principal Investigator of the project, introduced this new project to experts. She provided a brief insight into the purpose of this project, the role of the double burden of malnutrition in India and the importance of carrying out this project in the Karjat district of Maharashtra.

Dr. Vani Sethi from the UNICEF, New Delhi, moderated the first session. Dr. K. Kumaran from the University of Southampton, UK., and Holdsworth Memorial Hospital, Mysore, presented the Mysore Birth Record Cohort study.

The next speaker was Prof. C. Yajnik, Director, Diabetes Unit, KEM Hospital, Pune. Prof. Yajnik presented "Diabesity in Indians- A Life course Evolution Story of Pune Studies".

From the University of Southampton, UK, Dr. Sarah Kehoe presented the key highlights of the Mumbai Maternal Nutrition Cohort study carried out by University of Southampton and the MRC, UK in the suburban slum areas of Mumbai. Dr. Nadia Ansari from the Department of Paediatrics and Child Health at the Aga Khan University, Karachi, presented multiple maternal and child health studies carried out by the Aga Khan University.

Prof. Sayeed Unisa moderated the second session of the webinar. This session began with Mr. Raj Kumar Gope, the team lead for the EKJUT project, who presented the EKJUT Caring Trial: Community Action

Research to Improve Nutrition and Growth Among Children Under 2 Years in Rural India (Jharkhand and Odisha). The next speaker was Dr. Sangram K. Patel, Co-Lead, UDAYA Project, Population Council India. He presented the methodology, key findings, and challenges faced during the UDAYA study's implementation and progression among adolescents in Bihar and Uttar Pradesh. The next presenter was Dr. Praween Agrawal, Senior MEL Expert and MEL Team Lead- Raj Pusht, IPE global Limited, New Delhi. His presentation was based on the learning experience of CNNS and the importance of innovation and technology within the scope of population-based nutrition projects and programs. Dr. T. R. Dilip, Associate Professor, IIPS, proposed the vote of thanks.

The Institute served as a regional centre for Training and Research in Population Studies for the ESCAP region. The Institute was re-designated to its present title in 1985 to facilitate the expansion of its academic activities and was declared as a 'Deemed University' in August 19, 1985 under Section 3 of the UGC Act, 1956 by the Ministry of Human Resource Development, Government of India. The recognition has facilitated the award of recognized degrees by the Institute itself and paved the way for further expansion of the Institute as an academic institution. The faculty members and the supporting staff belong to diverse interdisciplinary backgrounds with specialisation in some core areas of population sciences, trained in India and abroad.

The Institute is the hub of population and health related teaching and research in India, playing a vital role for planning and development of the country. Students from different countries of Asia and the Pacific region, Africa and North America have been trained at the Institute. The alumni of IIPS hold prestigious positions in national and international organisations, universities, and reputed non-governmental organisations.

The Institute offers different Post-graduate and Doctoral programs and post-doctoral fellowships. After completing the program, students are well prepared for: admission to higher degree programmes in the best universities of the world; a good career in teaching and research; a multi-disciplinary professional career in development organisations; and can work as independent consultants.

1. National Family Health Survey 2019-21 (NFHS-5)

The **Karnataka state-level dissemination webinar** to release the Karnataka state report was held on 23 November, 2021 which was the first in the series of state-level dissemination seminars. Shri. NFHS-5 PIs organized this workshop in coordination with the Health Department, Government of Maharashtra and MoHFW. Representatives from the health departments of each of the states/UTs covered under the western region also attended and actively participated in the workshop.

2. South Asia Centre for Labour Mobility and Migrants (SALAM)

The conceptualization of the South Asia Centre for Labour Mobility and Migrants (SALAM) was jointly initiated by three UN agencies, namely ILO, IOM, and UN Women, under the GOALS (Governance of Labour Migration in South and Southeast Asia). The secretariat for the Migration Centre for South Asia will be located at IIPS. IIPS has joined with five new organizations in collaboration with some of the leading institutions working on migration in different countries of South Asia, namely- Refugee and Migratory Movements Research Unit (RMMRU) in Bangladesh, Centre for the Study of Labour and Mobility (CESLAM) at Social Science Baha in Nepal, Institute of Policy

Studies of Sri Lanka (IPS) in Sri Lanka and Sustainable Development Policy Institute (SDPI) in Pakistan.

The SALAM project was inaugurated on 24 November 2021. It was attended by more than 130 participants, including the donor agencies (ILO, IOM, and UN WOMEN) and the partner institutions from the South Asian region. The inauguration address was delivered by Ms. Dagmar Walter, Director, DWT South Asia, and India Country Office, on behalf of ILO, IOM, and UN Women.

With the aim of collaborating to establishing a Regional Learning and Action Platform – a Knowledge Hub on Labour Migration in South Asia for the "Governance of Labour Migration in South and South-East Asia (GOALS)", a project of the International Labour Organization, MoUs were signed with different institutions - RMMRU (Bangladesh), CESLAM (Nepal), IPS (Sri Lanka). However, a direct MoU was signed between SDPI (Pakistan) & ILO. MoUs have also been signed between IIPS, UN Universities UNU-MERIT Maastricht Graduate School of Governance, Maastricht University, Netherlands, and the University of California, Berkley, USA.

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The SALAM Secretariat at the IIPS conducted two meetings of the partner institutions to discuss the topic and concept note of the thematic papers with South-Asian countries, namely Nepal, Pakistan, Bangladesh, Sri Lanka, and India. The first meeting was conducted on 21.12.2021 in the online mode to decide the areas of the thematic papers to be published by partners and IIPS. The second meeting was conducted on 23.02.2022 in hybrid mode, in which all the partner institutions, along with IIPS, presented their tentative topics and concept notes. Currently, SALAM Secretariat is working on the regional thematic paper "Data for Labour Migration Governance in India: Needs, Gaps, and Challenges."

3. Protection of Children Affected by Seasonal Migration: A Study in Jalna District, Maharashtra

The research project titled, Protection of Children Affected by Seasonal Migration: A Study in Jalna District, India, is funded by UNICEF. The project coordinators are Prof. K.C. Das, Prof. R. B. Bhagat, and Dr. Archana K. Roy. The project aimed to study the education, health and protection issues of children affected by seasonal migration in Maharashtra and to recommend sustainable solutions for strengthening policies and programs. The Project was undertaken between Jan 2020 – May 2022, during which several meetings and activities were conducted as given below. Currently, the project is in the delivery stage. The study collected data from 1) the children and their parents/caregivers using PRA tools, in-depth interviews, and case narratives; 2) KIIs to get the perspectives of stakeholders, civil society representatives, and 'Mukadams' from February to August 2021. Following the data transcription and translations, a 3-day workshop on 'Qualitative Data Analysis & Finalization of Chapter Plan' was held on the 28th and 29th of May 2021 with Ms.Gomathy Balasubramanian (Tata Institute of Social Sciences) and Dr.Padma Deosthali (International Growth Centre).

The draft chapters were discussed with the TAC members on September 6th and December 8th, 2021 Furthermore, bilateral interactions with TAC members were held from 15-18 December 2021, to obtain their input on the Chapter concerning the policy recommendations. A meeting between Maaike Bijker (PRIME committee), Ms. Rajeshwari Chandrasekar (UNICEF) and the IIPS team was held on December 20, 2021 to review and approve the draft report. On 16th February 2022, a meeting with Ms. Sujata Saunik (Additional Chief Secretary, GoM) was held in order to review the draft Project report and Policy brief. Two papers from the study were presented at the 2021 IUSSP International Population Conference on the topic, "Harvesting the Troubles: The Vulnerabilities of Children of Seasonal Migrants Working in Sugarcane Fields, India" and

"Education of Children Affected by Seasonal Migration of Parents: Findings from a Field Study in Jalna District, Maharashtra, India".

BOOK PUBLISHED BY FACULTY

Population and the political imagination: census, register and citizenship in India by R. B. Bhagat.

The book identifies population as a central issue of polity and examines its links to ideas of state and citizenship. It explores the relationship between the state, citizenship and polity by re-examining processes related to census enumeration, population and citizen registers, and the politics of classificatory governmentality.

Religion, ethnicity, caste and political class play key roles in determining community identities and the relationship between an individual and the state. Contextualizing the arguments and controversies around the Citizenship (Amendment) Act 2019 (CAA 2019) and the National Register of Citizens (NRC), the book examines the processes of inclusion or exclusion of minorities and migrants as citizens in India. It focusses on the classification of irregular and refugee migration since independence in India, especially in the state of Assam.



The book highlights how political imagination, as a theoretical framework, shapes the processes and strategies for enumeration and classification and thereby, the idea of citizenship. Underlining the relationship between instruments of government, political mobilization and the resurgence of communal polarization, it also offers suggestions for alternative constructions of citizenship and an inclusive state. This book will be useful for students and researchers of population studies, population geography, migration studies, sociology, political science, social anthropology, law and journalism. It will also be of interest to policy makers, journalists, as well as NGOs and CSO.

Dr. Udaya S. ABOUT THE INSTITUTE

The International Institute for Population Sciences (IIPS), formerly known as the Demographic Training and Research Centre (DTRC) till 1970, was established in 1956 under the joint sponsorship of Sir Dorabji Tata Trust, the Government of India, and the United Nations. The Institute is under the administrative control of the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare, Government of India.

The Institute served as a regional centre for Training and Research in Population Studies for the ESCAP region. The Institute was re-designated to its present title in 1985 to facilitate the expansion of its academic activities and was declared as a 'Deemed University' in August 19, 1985 under Section 3 of the UGC Act, 1956 by the Ministry of Human Resource Development, Government of India. Dr. B.R. Ambedkar Memorial Lecture "The relevance of Ambedkar's thoughts in contemporary India"

Bharat Ratna Dr. Bhimrao Ramji Ambedkar (1891-1956) Babasaheb, as he is fondly known, was born on the 14th of April, 1891. He was a philosopher, economist, legal luminary, and a social revolutionary with an uncompromising commitment to protecting the human rights of millions of Indians. He has left an indelible mark on the Indian society, polity, and economy with his countless scholarly writings, pragmatic policies and strategies, and everlasting statesmanship. Of all, he was the main architect of the Constitution of India. When higher education was difficult to attain even for the most affluent class in India, Dr. Ambedkar reached New York, USA, in 1913 and secured an M.A. in Political Science with economics as a major subject and, subsequently, a Ph.D. in economics. He secured yet another Master's and a Doctorate from the London School of Economics in economics and, simultaneously, a law degree from The Honourable Society of Gray's Inn, London. Although Ambedkar was an indispensable choice for drafting the Indian Constitution due to his scholarship on constitution-making and his multiple doctorates from world-renowned universities, his voluminous writings, and speeches in diverse fields are hardly known, even among academicians.

Dr. Bhalchandra Laxman Mungekar (born on 2nd March 1946) is a former member of the Rajya Sabha and an Indian economist, educationist, and social worker. He is an excellent philosopher, writer, and mentor in the area of economics. He was a faculty member at the Ambedkar College's economics department in Mumbai. He specialises in agricultural economics and is an expert on B. R. Ambedkar. In 1965, he served as an Assistant economist at the Reserve Bank of India.

In his remarkable academic career, he has held a number of distinguished posts, including vice-Chancellor of the University of Mumbai and a member of the Planning Commission and the Agricultural Price Commission of India. In addition, he has been appointed Chairman of the University Grants Commission (UGC). He is currently a member of the Maharashtra government's Dr. Babasaheb Ambedkar Sahitya Prakashan Samiti.

Yet, there is an GSMA data suggests that inequality in mobile usage is much higher in India than Bangladesh and only marginally higher than Pakistan. Indian women do not use internet because of the reasons such as-rural broadband penetration is only 29 percent, and more men migrate to urban women is much lower compared to their men counterparts. Women are at triple disadvantages in terms of internet usage namely access of data (data doesn't reach rural areas), data affordability and common social norms. She explained that affordability is an issue as internet The first speaker Ms Mitali Nikore deliberated on the topic 'Building back better for India's girls'. She began with discussing how lucky are those who are able to tune in the internet and home. She also highlighted that Covid-19 pandemic led to a higher dependency on internet. areas as compared to women. Hence, exposure to mobile as well as to internet usage among usage incurs a substantial percent of their monthly wages. Lastly it is a prevalent social norm that women should not use mobile phones and hence, they are discouraged from using mobile inequality and exclusion crisis going on. The Global System for Mobile Communications, phones and internet usage. Ms Nikore also discussed how most of the society judge women for using mobile phones. It is for this is the closure of schools for longer time. Due to the schools' closure and eventual drop also evident that majority of the women possess basic or feature mobile phones. Ms Nikore pointed out one very important finding that the number of child marriages have increased substantially across the country in the post lockdown era due to the pandemic. A major reason out, early marriage problem is hovering over the older girls. The Mann Deshi foundation is working towards making the mobile phones accessible to women. It is providing no cost EMI to purchase smartphones for women.

There is a need for training women about the usage of mobile phones and enabling them to use it for their business. There are some tailored solutions at hand- providing free smartphones to programs should focus on digital literacy. This is a necessary skill and hence government the rural women which can be facilitated by CSR partners and making efforts at normalising women owning smartphones. ASHA/AWW should be provided smartphones. Moreover, Ms Nikore concluded with measures to address the deprivation that women are facing. should intervene and help in a better manner.

using the phones, someone of these two was always compromising. Women faced a lot of access. One part of India which was for masses and the other which was for classes. The class one had a smooth and easy shift from real world to virtual world. However, there were bigger 40-70 percent children do not have any access to any smart devices. The virus has divided the country in two parts with respect to digital problems for masses for instance like having electricity for less than 12 hours for more than 45 percent of the population. Around 320 million children are out of school due to pandemic and vaccination due to lack of phone or internet. There is a question of autonomy and ownership of mobile phones more than the access. There is a need for gender segregated data.
